This course is designed and offered as an effort to enhance the sociology curriculum in the fields of race, class, gender, stratification, and institutional studies. Readings on the military, as an institution, are accompanied by classical readings on theory and readings that focus on the impact of military service on outcomes by varying statuses. Students critically engage with the readings and discuss how institutional policies and practices have significant and lingering impact on American society. Additionally, this course will provide both sociology and non-sociology students with an opportunity to study an institution that has a large presence in the Puget Sound. More specifically, Tacoma Community College is surrounded by three different military installations—the Army, Navy, and Air Force. As such, this course could attract those who are or have served in the military, students with military affiliations, as well as, students from a very broad spectrum who may otherwise be curious or may not know the extent to which the understanding of social institutions, such as the military, can have in the lives of individuals, families, and communities at large. Additionally, this is the only such course that will be offered along the entire Puget Sound. In addition, the focus on theory, institutions, race, class, and gender allow this course to add to our current breadth of American Ethnic and Gender Studies (AEGS) Distinction Pathways offerings. As currently written, BIOL& 100 must touch on all basic areas of biology, which means a very large amount of material must be covered in a small amount of time, with little depth. Most of our students come to BIOL& 100 with some knowledge of these basic biological principles from course work in high school. We believe that our students are capable of a deeper focus on areas of biology that are most applicable to modern society. We also believe that we can increase student engagement by having more focused themes for biology, instead of a broad overview of topics. Additionally, our new outcomes allow for flexibility that would allow instructors to teach topics that they are passionate about. This passion can be infectious, increasing student interest and involvement. 	Curriculum Requirements: 1. We removed English 301 as a required course. Initially we were unsure how prepared students would be to enter the bachelor programs – after receiving numerous transcripts over the first year we found that the majority of students already met the State requirement of 10 credits of communication courses. If requiring English 301 we found we were adding on an additional 5 credits of courses to students who were already prepared. The degree still requires 10 cred of communication distribution – it just allows that to be done at any college level 100-400. 2. We removed LS 301 from the distribution area as this is not designated as a distribution course. This course is still required for the degree it has just been moved to the Core Requirement area.
