



## **FULL-TIME RETENTION: DEGREE-SEEKING VS. NON-SEEKING STUDENTS**

Full-time degree-seeking students are retained at a higher rate than full-time non-degree seeking students



■ degree-seeking
■ non degree-seeking



Students may be full-time and non-degree seeking for a number of reasons. For example, some students may be pursuing English as a Second Language or a high school diploma. However, a number of the full-time non-degree seeking students fall in the undeclared or undecided category. Identifying why students are non-degree seeking and providing intentional support helps students realize their educational aspirations, a key guided pathways principle.

## **Retention Gap**

There is a large retention gap between full-time degree seeking students and full-time nondegree seeking students.



## **Largest Gap**

The largest retention gap for the full-time non-degree seeking students happens in fall to spring transition, For every 10 full-time degree seeking students in the fall, about 2 full-time non-degree seeking students do not return in the spring.
